Historian Report

June Marks Two WWII Turning Points

• June is the anniversary of two key battles that marked turning points in WW II in both the Pacific and European theaters.

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On June 4, 1942, the Battle of Midway began. Because cryptanalysts had broken the Japanese communications codes, the U.S. knew Japan would be launching an air assault on its Midway Island base. As a result, a U.S. aircraft carrier task force was waiting east of the island. Following the expected attack, the Japanese aircraft returned to their carriers to rearm and refuel.

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At that point, aircraft from the USS Enterprise, USS Hornet and USS Yorktown attacked the Japanese fleet, catching many of the enemy planes on deck. Torpedo and dive bombers destroyed three Japanese carriers, one cruiser and hundreds of aircraft. The Yorktown was hit and severely damaged by planes flown from the fourth, surviving Japanese carrier, the Hiryu. However, by day's end planes from Enterprise sank the Hiryu.

- Two days later, a Japanese submarine torpedoed the Yorktown while the ship was undergoing salvage operations as well as sinking an accompanying destroyer, USS Hammann. The Yorktown itself sank on June 7.
- The Battle of Midway continued through June 6 at sea and on the island, eventually forcing a Japanese retreat. The Japanese lost more than 3,000 men, four carriers, a heavy cruiser and hundreds of aircraft. U.S. losses were 360 men, one carrier, one destroyer and 144 aircraft. The battle crippled the Japanese fleet and ended that country's expansion in the Pacific as the island-hopping campaign by Allies shrank the empire to its home islands.
- Two years later, on June 6, 1944, troops from the U.S. and its Allies launched an amphibious assault on the beaches of Normandy in the largest land, sea and air invasion in history. The D-Day landings were preceded by paratrooper landings to block key approaches to the beachhead and prevent German reinforcements.
- A huge naval bombardment began at 5:30 am on D-Day before wave after wave of landing vessels carried more than 150,000 ground troops to storm five beaches: Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword. The Germans placed their heaviest defenses at Omaha, which combined with coastal cliffs to make it the site of the day's bloodiest fighting. In all, more than 4,000 Allied troops died, including more than 2,500 Americans.
- In addition to troops, D-Day landed more than 50,000 vehicles and 100,000 tons of equipment.
- Following June 6, Allied forces broke out from the Normandy beaches and fought fiercely through the area hedgerows – walls of thick vegetation that hindered progress and provided ideal defense positions. Ground efforts, plus a massive air assault, broke German resistance. By August, the Allies had liberated Paris and continued a relentless push that ended with Nazi defeat in May of the following year/


Remembering......

But our last Mission of the Day was to bring our Fallen Marines back to the base morgue. That was their 1st leg home to their families. **Remembering.....**

VA Claim Processing

Lets talk a bit about VA's claim processing. When we file a claim it seems forever before we have a decision.

We wait and wait and the response never comes. Its very easy to say the VA is a big bureaucracy that is bogged down to a crawl in red tape.

The reality is pretty much the opposite. The VA has processed more than one million Veteran benefit claims in fiscal year 2024, the fastest rate in VA history. Through February of this fiscal year, the VA provided \$69 billion in earned compensation and pension benefits to 6.5 million Veterans and survivors.

The PACT Act has brought a whole new dimension to the scene. Veterans apply for benefits at record rates, with VA receiving 4.5% more claims thus far in fiscal year 2024 than at this point in 2023. Since the PACT Act was signed into law, Veterans and their families have filed more than 3.5 million claims.

As a result of this record pace, Veteran claims pending over 125 days – known as the backlog – has decreased by more than 42,000 claims over the past three months. Due to the record number of claim applications, the backlog is still expected to grow in 2024 before decreasing at the end of this year.

It seems to me we have to give the VA a little credit for working hard to keep up with the demand caused by the PACT ACT. Remember, patience is a virtue.
