

Citizen of the Year

Naperville American Legion Post 43 began naming a Citizen of the Year in 1986. We are again asking for community assistance to identify deserving candidates, and we especially would like input from our own American Legion and VFW members.

Nominee's service must be in support of the Naperville area or its bordering communities. Members of the American Legion, Sons of the Legion, VFW, and Auxiliary are eligible, but it is not limited to. The service must have been performed in a volunteer capacity, rather than as part of compensated employment.

Anyone may nominate a candidate by sending a letter or email that includes a comprehensive description of the services the nominee performed, the time frame, duration, and significance of the service to others, and the category they are being nominated for, along with the name and contact information for the nominee and the person offering the nomination. Letters from others endorsing the nominee are encouraged.

Naperville is blessed with people who serve their fellow citizens. Typically, the judges have a very difficult task. Comprehensive information, attachments, and endorsements may be included, and are of great help to the committee in selecting the winner. Nomination may be mailed to The American Legion Post 43, Citizen of the Year, Post Office Box 4, Naperville, 60566 or emailed to r.yndestad@yahoo.com or rios.nadia@gmail.com to arrive no later than March 31, 2025.

The winner will be announced in the local media and honored at The American Legion's Awards and Recognition Banquet on April 19th, 2025. So, fire up your keyboard; sharpen your pencil; and make sure the selection committee knows about your candidate.

Historian Report

U.S. and France fight Quasi War

On February 9, 1799, the U.S. frigate Constellation fought and captured the French ship L'Insurgente – the first U.S. ship to defeat an enemy warship since the U.S. won independence.

Why was the U.S. fighting France, which was a key ally in the American Revolution? After all, France had supplied some 12,000 soldiers as well as warships and 22,000 sailors to support the rebellion against the British.

The answer lies in a tangle of commercial disputes and the complex politics of 19th Century Europe.

In the 1790s, France was engaged in the War of the First Coalition with several countries, including Great Britain. Consequently, France resented the U.S. trading with its continental enemy. Our nation's signing the Jay Treaty with Britain – a pact that normalized relations between the countries – intensified France's ill feelings.

For these reasons beginning in 1796, French privateers began seizing American ships that were trading with Britain. For the next several years, France took by force some 300 ships.

The U.S. sent envoys to France in an effort to resolve their differences diplomatically. That effort only made the relationship worse when French representatives threatened financial penalties, demanded an end to trading with its enemies and even threatened invasion. In addition, there was a demand for personal financial rewards for members of the French government.

Diplomatic papers describing these demands for bribes and threats became public with the names of the French diplomats replaced with the letters, X Y and Z. What became known as the XYZ Affair caused outrage in the U.S. and prompted Congress to cancel treaties with France in 1798 and authorize the U.S. Navy to respond with force to French attempts to seize our country's ships. The authorization stopped short of a declaration of war, hence the term, Quasi War.

This undeclared war was fought mainly in the West Indies, between the North Atlantic and Caribbean Sea.

Hostilities continued as the U.S. Navy grew from six to 30 commissioned vessels. These forces eventually took some 85 French ships as prizes. Fortunately, the fighting was relatively light with the U.S. suffering 160 casualties and the French some 100.

Because of their past friendly relationship, the U.S. and France renewed efforts to negotiate a resolution to their differences, Those efforts concluded with the Convention of 1800, which, despite some lingering disputes, concluded the Quasi War.

While the fighting and subsequent treaty did not provide a clear resolution to all their differences underlying the Quasi War, it did establish the U.S. as a power that had to be reck-
