Naperville Post 43 Donations to help fellow Legionnaires in need

Citizen of the Year

Anyone may nominate a candidate by sending a letter or email that includes a comprehensive description of the services the nominee performed, the time frame, duration, and significance of the service to others, and the category they are being nominated for, along with the name and contact information for the nominee and the person offering the nomination. Letters from others endorsing the nominee are encouraged.

Naperville is blessed with people who serve their fellow citizens. Typically, the judges have a very difficult task. Comprehensive information, attachments, and endorsements may be included, and are of great help to the committee in selecting the winner. Nomination may be mailed to The American Legion Post 43, Citizen of the Year, Post Office Box 4, Naperville, 60566 or emailed to r.yndestad@yahoo.com or rios.nadia@gmail.com to arrive no later than March 31, 2025.

The winner will be announced in the local media and honored at The American Legion's Awards and Recognition Banquet on April 19th, 2025. So, fire up your keyboard; sharpen your pencil; and make sure the selection committee knows about your candidate.

Historian Report

This month marks the beginning of a controversial and unfortunate period in U.S. history.

Two months after the Dec. 7, 1941 Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, in a nation wracked with anxiety, President Franklin Roosevelt issued Executive Order 9066. That order authorized the Secretary of War to evacuate anyone deemed a threat from our country's West Coast.

Army Lt. Gen. John L. Dewitt, head of the Western Defense Command, was tasked with executing the order. His effort began with curfews for Japanese Americans, followed by encouraging voluntary evacuations. Approximate 11 percent of the Japanese American population complied with the voluntary evacuation.

However, on March 29, 1942 DeWitt moved to force the evacuation and detention of Japanese American West Coast residents upon 48-hour notice. The affected people had only that limited time to arrange for the care of their property. If they were unable to meet this tight deadline, their homes, farms, businesses and private belongings were permanently forfeited.

From March to August, some 112,000 persons were sent to assembly centers – typically racetracks or fairgrounds – and subsequently sent to relocation centers. The centers were located in remote areas in seven states from California to Arkansas. Of those incarcerated, nearly 70,000 were American citizens and no actual charges of disloyalty were filed against any of the evacuees.

In the relocation centers, also known as internment camps, four or five families usually shared single, non-insulated barracks. Most internees lived under these conditions for nearly three years with limited opportunity for schooling, work or social activities. Families had meals in common areas and shared restrooms. Many never returned to their prior homes.

The circumstances of the internment and the harsh conditions at the relocations centers raised political questions and officials debated the constitutionality of the forced relocations without any evidence of disloyalty and with no legal process to justify the action.

As the war drew closer to an end, the internment camps were gradually shut down. Also, in recognition of the loyalty of its Japanese American citizens, the government assembled combat units from the internees to fight in Europe. The 442nd Regimental Combat Team made up of Japanese Americans became one of the highly decorated units of World War II.

In the years since World War II, the injustice of the Japanese American internment became increasingly recognized. In 1988, Congress passed for President Ronald Reagan's signature the Civil Liberties Act that acknowledged the racist error, issued an official apology and allocated compensation for these incarcerated.

Also, we will be laying a wreath at the Veterans Park wall and after this Service we will move to our "Gold Star Family Memorial" to lay a wreath at our Memorial in honor of all that paid the "Ultimate Sacrifice" while serving in All Wars.

As in the past, this will be open to the public, especially all Veterans. Seating will be available for those that need to sit and there will be ample parking available across the street at Grace United Methodist Church.

VA dismisses more than 1,000 employees, was a headline in a recent news release from the VA. This of course spawned the rumor mills. The most recent being the VA will start limiting services and reduce the overall level of current service.

Let me try to allay your fears. Keep in mind the VA organization is very, very large. A quick google search reveals there are currently approximately 473,000 employees serving veterans. Let's do some simple math:

1000 / 473000 x 100= 0.2%

Keep in mind the staff released were all probationary people. All still in the early stages of learning their jobs.. So, if the departed staff are all new and way less than 1% of the staff are released, I think the VA performance in the coming months will remain unchanged. Be the one to stop the rumors and thus scaring and angering your fellow veterans.
