
As always, if you need help, reach out. Let's all strive to make a positive difference in the lives of our fellow veterans, their families and in our community. Semper Fidelis!

As this is the 23rd Anniversary of the attack on our Country, this will again be a very special event as we pay homage and our respects to all those innocent men and women that were lost because of that dreadful attack on our Country and those lost fighting in harm's way to protect our Freedoms. Also, this will be the 21st Anniversary of the Dedication of our Memorial Wall. In the event of inclement weather, we will be moving into City Hall.

This year our Guest Speaker will be Elizabeth McConkie, Sophomore @ Sycamore H.S. Elizabeth was a participant in our VFW "Voice of Democracy". We will again have our Combined Post Honor Guard and Color Guard presenting Honors along with Rich Yndestad and Bob Binder Sounding Echo Taps. I am sure everyone remembers that awful day in our history or has a personal connection with this event. With that said, I would like to share my personal connection. The Marine H-34 helicopter pilot I flew my 1st two Combat Missions in Vietnam as his co-pilot was lost at the Pentagon. Once he got out of the Marines, he joined the National Guard and was stationed in the Pentagon. After the attack he was able to get out but heard someone call for help and he went back in, and his body was recovered later. His name was William Ruth. We always called him "Baby Ruth" because he was short in height, and maybe weighed 120 lbs. His name is on the "9/11" Pentagon Memorial at Arlington National Cemetery. I have personally checked that out.

We hope you can be part of this very special "Remembrance Day" Service.

Historian Report

A Legendary Era Comes to an End

Nearly 140 years ago this month an epic pursuit came to an end with the surrender of the Chiricahua Apache leader Geronimo.

For some 25 years, the U.S. Army had tried to capture Geronimo without success. At one point an estimated 5,000 American troops – nearly one-quarter of the standing U.S. Army – and 3,000 Mexican soldiers were involved in the pursuit across the Southwest desert both in this country and Mexico.

Geronimo was not a warrior chief like his counterpart Cochise. Instead he was a medicine man whom his followers believe had magical powers. They attributed to him the ability to elude bullets and arrows. In addition, Geronimo was thought to be able to foresee the future as well as an awareness of events that were taking place miles away.

Whatever supernatural gifts he may have possessed, there was no doubt about Geronimo's ability to elude his enemies. In addition, during the rare times he was in custody – mainly as the result of voluntary surrender – Geronimo repeatedly escaped. He was also known to renege on agreements to give himself up because of his own loose interpretation of what surrender meant.

Geronimo did not need supernatural assistance to remain free of his pursuers. As an Apache, he was keenly aware of the desert landscape and used its canyons, gullies and mountains to hide his movements. He also was an excellent horseman, able to cover many miles per day to leave his would be captors in his dust.

In addition to horsemanship, however, he and his followers inherited an unfortunate trait. His tribe had a tradition of raiding to obtain supplies and horses. At one time in 1883, Geronimo and his compatriots in a series of raids were said to make off with 2,000 horses, including 60 Mexican cavalry horses. This practice intensified efforts to end his freedom.

His ability to use the desert as an effective shield led the Army to hire Apache scouts, including Chiricahua, to track Geronimo but he was able to escape their grasp time after time. He also benefitted by fateful accidents. In one instance as U.S troops were closing in on him, a group of Mexican soldiers mistakenly attacked them, killing their leader, Captain Emmett Crawford.

The decades of flight eventually wore Geronimo down and in September 1886 he did finally surrender for good. He spent the rest of his life in captivity, although he took time to appear in Wild West shows and rode in President Theodore Roosevelt's inauguration parade. He died at the Fort Sill, Okla., reservation in 1909 at 79 years of age.

Legend has it that Geronimo's ability to escape was not over, however. Supposedly, a team of Chiricahua compatriots removed his body from Fort Sill and brought it back to the Apache Southwest homeland where he was laid to rest in his desert home.
